Reading together



- If you read together every day, it will help give your child a lifelong love of books and reading.
- Time spent sharing books with your child helps to create a special bond between you.
- You can enjoy books together anywhere and anytime.
- Sharing a bedtime story is a great way to end the day.

Getting started



- Once you have read your book together, go back and talk about what you can both see on the pages.
- Encourage your child to join in with the story. Ask them questions like 'What do you think will happen next?' and 'What can you see on this page?'
- Give your child plenty of time to answer your questions. It takes them longer to work things out, so try not to rush them.
- Make sure your child has books to enjoy, alongside their toys and games. Then they can look at a book whenever they feel like it.




The book in your Bookstart pack

Now that you have a new book to read with your child, these useful tips will help you make the most of it. To begin with, read your new book slowly so your child can hear the words clearly. It's how they learn to talk and listen, which will help them to learn and make friends as they grow up.

When your child becomes more confident you can add in different voices and noises and speed up the pace when the story gets exciting. The most important thing is to have fun together!

- Ask your child to see what different things they can spot on each page

Using your new finger puppet

There are lots of great ways to have fun with finger puppets. Your child will love it if you use them to bring their favourite book to life or to tell your own stories.

There are no right or wrong ways to enjoy playing with puppets, but here are a few ideas to get you started!

Getting to know your puppet:

It is a good idea to introduce your puppet slowly. Make the puppet look away or downwards until your child is happy to play.

 Gently move your puppet to look at your child when they speak to it. This shows them that the puppet is responding to them.

Puppet play:

- Puppets can help children to open up and join in. Let your child get to know the puppet by making it dance.
- You could make your puppet sing a song! Or you could tickle your child with the puppet and watch them smile and giggle.

Reading along:

 Help your child to follow where you are in a book by using a puppet to read along with you. Point the puppet at the word you are reading and use it to turn the page.

Reading the story in a made-up puppet voice will add to the fun! It doesn't matter what it sounds like as long as it is a bit different from your own.

Pretend play:

Try giving your puppet its own personality and asking what it thinks about everyday things.

This will help your child to learn about other people's feelings and ideas.

 If your child is able to, they can wear the puppet and use it to turn the pages.
 Give them lots of time to join in and use their imaginations!

Acting out the story:

 Using a puppet to act out a story can help your child to understand what's going on and learn how to pretend play. Pick a character from your book and use the puppet to show what they are doing.



The puppet can talk to your child about its friends in the book and how each character is different. The more you make the puppet behave, move or speak like the character in a story, the more your child will enjoy it!

Making up your own story:



 You don't have to read stories from a book. You can make up your own by asking simple story questions like:

> Who shall be in our story? Where are they? What happens in our story?

 This will help your child join in with the story and develop their speaking and listening skills.




A colourful board book in which the ever-popular Elmer the Elephant praises each of his friends for their different strengths. An ideal starting point for talking about individuality.

of touch-and-feel elements, peek-through holes and flaps to lift up and look under.




