**Activity explainer (to be used alongside video)** 

**Purpose:** To explore the use of descriptive language and encourage imagination and creativity.

Materials needed: Scissors, coloured pencils, shape stickers (optional), sock template.

**Option 1:** Shoe boxes or other similar sized box, paint

Option 2: Paper, paint, Blu Tack

## **Preparation**

Cut out the 'Sock Template' as required – enough for the group plus extra.

Pre-colour your extra 'Sock Templates' – one for each colour in the rhyme (rainbow / turquoise / red / white / yellow / purple), or, if you are feeling creative, draw dinosaurs / cats / dolphins or one of the other patterns mentioned in the rhyme.

### **Activity Time**

#### Step 1:

Listen to the rhyme / watch the animation of the rhyme / sing the rhyme as a group. Repeat listening as many times as you wish.

#### Step 2:

Hold up the pre-coloured socks one at a time. Ask the group to tell you the colour or describe the pattern. Do they have a favourite?

## Step 3:

Hand out the 'Sock Templates' and ask the group to design their own odd sock.





**Activity explainer (to be used alongside video)** 

### Step 4:

Part way through the designing task or on completion, ask individuals in the group to describe their sock.

Possible questions: What colours have they used? What patterns? Is the sock for them to wear or for someone else?

## Step 5:

### Option 1:

Hand out a shoe box / box to each child.

Ask them to paint the box as they would like it.

Ask them to add their name to the top of the box – **{name}** sock box. The words 'sock box' could be printed and cut out ready or written depending on the age of the group.

Once the box is dry the child can take the box home to keep their odd socks / pairs of socks in.

## Option 2:

Draw, cut out and paint a pair of trees with branches but no leaves – as big as possible to accommodate the odd socks your group have designed.

Stick the trees to the wall of your setting.

Once the group have finished designing their odd socks add the socks to the tree branches with Blu Tack as if they were leaves.

Streipiog (Stripey), Smotiog (Spotty), Enfys (Rainbow), Fer / Byr (Short), Flodeuog / Blodeuog (Flowery), Befriog / Pefriog (Sparkly), Wyrddlas / Gwyrddlas (Turquoise), Hir (Long), Mochyn (Pig), Goch a gwyn / Coch a gwyn (Red and white), Felen / Melyn (Yellow), Arth (Bear), Borffor / Porffor (Purple), Deinosor (Dinosaur), Dolffin (Dolphin), Cath (Cat)





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
